#### To Our Guests and Visitors about Receiving Holy Communion:

- 1. In Orthodox churches, Holy Communion is given to and received only by members of the Orthodox Church (the baptized and chrismated who strive to live in repentance, faith, and godliness).
- If you are non-Orthodox, please refrain from approaching the Chalice, but speak with Fr. Jonathan after the Liturgy. If you are Orthodox and unfamiliar to the Priest, please introduce yourself to Fr. Jonathan prior to the Liturgy, otherwise at the Chalice.
- Please approach the Chalice in the following order: children first; then rowby-row from the front of Church, going to the Chalice on the side you are positioned (if there are two Chalices), returning to your place by the outside aisle past the table with the antidoron (bread and wine).

## Acts 1:1-8 (Epistle)

The former account I made, O Theophilus, of all that Jesus began both to do and teach, until the day in which He was taken up, after He through the Holy Spirit had given commandments to the apostles whom He had chosen, to whom He also presented Himself alive after His suffering by many infallible proofs, being seen by them during forty days and speaking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God. And being assembled together with them, He commanded them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the Promise of the Father, "which," He said, "you have heard from Me; for John truly baptized with water, but you shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now." Therefore, when they had come together, they asked Him, saying, "Lord, will You at this time restore the kingdom to Israel?" And He said to them,

"It is not for you to know times or seasons which the Father has put in His own authority. But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."

John 1:1-17 (Gospel)

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through Him, and without Him nothing was made that was made. In Him was life, and the life was the light of men. And the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not comprehend it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. This man came for a witness, to bear witness of the Light, that all through him might believe. He was not that Light, but was sent to bear witness of that Light. That was the true Light which gives light to every man coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world was made through Him, and the world did not know Him. He came to His own, and His own did not receive Him. But as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to become children of God, to those who believe in His name: who were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth. John bore witness of Him and cried out, saying, "This was He of whom I said, 'He who comes after me is preferred before me, for He was before me." And of His fullness we have all received, and grace for grace. For the law was given through Moses, but grace and truth came through Jesus Christ.

#### PASCHA MEANING & PRACTICES

- \* The word **Pascha** is the Hebrew word *Pesach* rendered in Greek, and now English, letters (see 1 Cor. 5:7). **Pascha** means "Passover," our Christian Passover fulfilled in the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus Christ our Savior, accomplished at the time of the Jewish Passover; therefore, Orthodox Pascha always follows the Jewish Passover, which is why the date of Orthodox Pascha frequently differs from Western Easter.
- \* The week following the Feast of Pascha is called **Bright Week** and is liturgically considered one day in which the Sun of Righteousness has risen (Mal. 3:20). During Bright Week, each weekday Liturgy repeats the Paschal Liturgy, the doors in the Iconostasis (Icon-screen) remain fully open, and each day is fast-free.
- \* The Sunday after the Feast of Pascha is known as **Antipascha**, meaning "instead of Pascha." In other words, the Sunday after Pascha (and every Sunday, the Day of Resurrection) has essentially the same meaning as the Feast of Pascha itself. The Church every Sunday gathered in Divine Liturgy celebrates and participates fully in the death and resurrection of Christ Jesus.
- \* It is customary in many Orthodox churches to bless **Pascha baskets** at the conclusion of the Paschal Liturgy. Pascha baskets typically contain the foods from which we fasted during the season of Lent and Holy Week: various meats, eggs, and dairy dishes (e.g., Pascha bread, butter, sweet custards, etc.).
- \* Pascha eggs (usually dyed red, or ornately decorated) are an ancient symbol of the Resurrection as they depict a lifeless tomb from which a living person emerges, beginning with Christ Jesus Himself. Red eggs recall the miracle worked through Mary Magdalene when she was conversing with Tiberius, Pontius Pilate's successor, her white eggs turning red to demonstrate the truth of the resurrection of Christ.

English: Christ is risen! Indeed He is risen!
Greek: Christos anesti! Alithos anesti!
Slavonic: Khristos voskrese! Voistinu voskrese!
Romanian: Hristo a inviat! Adevarat a inviat!
Arabic: El Messieh kahm! Hakken kahm!

Spanish: Cristo ha resucitado! En verdad ha resucitado!
