To Our Guests and Visitors about Receiving Holy Communion:

- 1. In Orthodox churches, Holy Communion is given to and received only by members of the Orthodox Church (the baptized and chrismated who strive to live in repentance, faith, and godliness).
- 2. If you are non-Orthodox, please refrain from approaching the Chalice, but speak with Fr. Jonathan after the Liturgy. If you are Orthodox and unfamiliar to the Priest, please introduce yourself to Fr. Jonathan prior to the Liturgy, otherwise at the Chalice.
- **3.** Please approach the Chalice in the following order: children first; then rowby-row from the front of Church, going to the Chalice on the side you are positioned (if there are two Chalices), returning to your place by the outside aisle past the table with the *antidoron* (bread and wine).

## 2 Corinthians 1:21-2:4 (Epistle)

Now He who establishes us with you in Christ and has anointed us is God, who also has sealed us and given us the Spirit in our hearts as a guarantee.\* Moreover I call God as witness against my soul, that to spare you I came no more to Corinth. Not that we have dominion over your faith, but are fellow workers for your joy; for by faith you stand. But I determined this within myself, that I would not come again to you in sorrow. For if I make you sorrowful, then who is he who makes me glad but the one who is made sorrowful by me? And I wrote this very thing to you, lest, when I came, I should have sorrow over those from whom I ought to have joy, having confidence in you all that my joy is the joy of you all. For out of much affliction and anguish of heart I wrote to you, with many tears, not that you should be grieved, but that you might know the love which I have so abundantly for you.

## Luke 6:31-36 (Gospel)

And just as you want men to do to you, you also do to them likewise. But if you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what credit is that to you? For even sinners do the same. And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive back, what credit is that to you? For even sinners lend to sinners to receive as much back. But love your enemies, do good, and lend, hoping for nothing in return; and your reward will be great, and you will be sons of the Most High. For He is kind to the unthankful and evil. Therefore be merciful, just as your Father also is merciful.

<sup>\*</sup> The Apostle references an *anointing* and *seal*, which is Orthodox Chrismation (see also Eph. 1:13; 1 Jn. 2:20, 27; Rev. 7:3). With Baptism, Christians are literally anointed and sealed with the Holy Chrism, that is, specially prepared aromatic olive oil.

#### Theotokion Tone 6

Steadfast Protectress of Christians Constant Advocate before the Creator Do not despise the cries of us sinners But in your goodness come speedily to help us who call on you in faith Hasten to hear our petitions and to intercede for us, O Theotokos// For you always protect those who honor you!

\* Saint Cyriacus, the son of an Orthodox Priest, was born in Corinth in 448. Tonsured a Reader at 18, he left Corinth for Jerusalem without his family's knowledge. Saint Euthymius made him a monk but sent him to St. Gerasimus by the Jordan River, where he remained until St. Gerasimus's repose 9 years later Returning to the monastery of St. Euthymius, Cyriacus dwelt in solitude, not staying long because of the laxity of the monks there and their continual disputing with another monastery of St. Theoctistus. Fleeing scandal and trouble, Cyriacus went to the Lavra (monastic cells joined on a common alleyway) of St. Chariton at Souka, eventually being ordained a Priest at age 40; throughout these years, he was free of anger and never ate before sunset. When 70 years old, Cyriacus went away with one disciple into the wilderness of Natoupha, enduring torments for the love of Christ and eating only wild onions. More and more faithful sought him out there to hear a word of salvation and be freed from evil spirits, so Cyriacus, now 90, moved further into the remote desert of Sousakim where he lived alone with a tame lion that watched over his little garden. During a deadly epidemic, the fathers at Souka persuaded Cyriacus to return where he protected them by his prayers and refuted the Origenist heresy (i.e., universalism) leading many Palestinian monks astray. When 99, he returned to Sousakim and lived in extreme asceticism for 8 more years, falling asleep in peace and godliness at the age of 107.
