To Our Guests and Visitors about Receiving Holy Communion:

- 1. In Orthodox churches, Holy Communion is given to and received only by members of the Orthodox Church (the baptized and chrismated who strive to live in repentance, faith, and godliness).
- 2. If you are non-Orthodox, please refrain from approaching the Chalice, but speak with Fr. Jonathan after the Liturgy. If you are Orthodox and unfamiliar to the Priest, please introduce yourself to Fr. Jonathan prior to the Liturgy, otherwise at the Chalice.
- 3. Please approach the Chalice in the following order: children first; then rowby-row from the front of Church, going to the Chalice on the side you are positioned (if there are two Chalices), returning to your place by the outside aisle past the table with the *antidoron* (bread and wine).

"I will be a Father to you, and you shall be My sons and daughters, says the LORD Almighty." Therefore, having these promises, beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all filthiness of the flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God.

Luke 16:19-31 (Gospel)

There was a certain rich man who was clothed in purple and fine linen and fared sumptuously every day. But there was a certain beggar named Lazarus, full of sores, who was laid at his gate, desiring to be fed with the crumbs which fell from the rich man's table. Moreover the dogs came and licked his sores. So it was that the beggar died, and was carried by the angels to Abraham's bosom. The rich man also died and was buried. And being in torments in Hades, he lifted up his eyes and saw Abraham afar off, and Lazarus in his bosom. Then he cried and said, 'Father Abraham, have mercy on me, and send Lazarus that he may dip the tip of his finger in water and cool my tongue; for I am tormented in this flame.' But Abraham said, 'Son, remember that in your lifetime you received your good things, and likewise Lazarus evil things; but now he is comforted and you are tormented. And besides all this, between us and you there is a great gulf fixed, so that those who want to pass from here to you cannot, nor can those from there pass to us.' Then he said, 'I beg you therefore, father, that you would send him to my father's house, for I have five brothers, that he may testify to them, lest they also come to this place of torment.' Abraham said to him, 'They have Moses and the prophets; let them hear them.' And he said, 'No, father Abraham; but if one goes to them from the dead, they will repent.' But he said to him, 'If they do not hear Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded though one rise from the dead.""

^{*} St. Artemius was an Egyptian by birth and a chief commander under the Emperor Constantine the Great (d. 337). Eventually appointed Imperial Governor of Egypt, St. Artemius was responsible for bringing the relics of both the Apostle Andrew (from Patras) and Saint Luke (from Thebes) to Constantinople where they were placed in the Church of the Holy Apostles. Constantine was succeeded in the East by his son Constantius, who was usurped by his cousin Julian, called the Apostate because he abandoned Christianity and reverted to the pagan religion of idolatry. The Emperor Julian called St. Artemius and his army to Antioch to prosecute the war against the Persians. When the Emperor seized two Christian priests and subjected them to torture, St. Artemius became disturbed and confronted the emperor, even prophesying his imminent death. The priests were sent into exile, and St. Artemius was himself tortured and thrown into prison, eventually smashed between two large stones and beheaded. The year was 362, and shortly thereafter the Emperor Julian went out personally against the Persians and was killed in battle, as St. Artemius had foretold.
