- 1. In Orthodox churches, Holy Communion is given to and received only by members of the Orthodox Church (the baptized and chrismated who strive to live in repentance, faith, and godliness).
- 2. If you are non-Orthodox, please refrain from approaching the Chalice, but speak with Fr. Jonathan after the Liturgy. If you are Orthodox and unfamiliar to the Priest, please introduce yourself to Fr. Jonathan prior to the Liturgy, otherwise at the Chalice.
- **3.** Please approach the Chalice in the following order: children first; then rowby-row from the front of Church, going to the Chalice on the side you are positioned (if there are two Chalices), returning to your place by the outside aisle past the table with the *antidoron* (bread and wine).

Galatians 2:16-20 (Epistle)

[K]nowing that a man is not justified by the works of the law but by faith in Jesus Christ, even we have believed in Christ Jesus, that we might be justified by faith in Christ and not by the works of the law; for by the works of the law no flesh shall be justified. But if, while we seek to be justified by Christ, we ourselves also are found sinners, is Christ therefore a minister of sin? Certainly not! For if I build again those things which I destroyed, I make myself a transgressor. For I through the law died to the law that I might live to God. I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me.

Luke 12:16-21 (Gospel)

Then He spoke a parable to them, saying: "The ground of a certain rich man yielded plentifully. And he thought within himself, saying, 'What shall I do, since I have no room to store my crops? So he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build greater, and there I will store all my crops and my goods. 'And I will say to my soul, "Soul, you have many goods laid up for many years; take your ease; eat, drink, and be merry."' But God said to him, 'Fool! This night your soul will be required of you; then whose will those things be which you have provided?' So is he who lays up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God."

* Saint Gregory was the Bishop of Neocaesarea in Pontus, born into an illustrious pagan family about the year 214. Sent to Beirut to study at a famous law school, Gregory (then, Theodore) and his brother took their sister to Caesarea in Palestine where they met the great Christian scholar Origen. They gave up their legal studies, were students of Origen for 8 years, and were afterward baptized. Avoiding Origen's various errors of speculation, Gregory returned to Pontus and lived alone in ascesis in the wilderness for several years. Faidimus, the Archbishop of nearby Amasia, knew of Gregory's virtues and installed him as bishop of Neocaesarea without Greogry's consent or physical consecration, to which Gregory eventually obeyed after days and nights in prayer. Informed of the mystery of the Holy Trinity by direct revelation from the Theotokos and Saint John the Theologian (Apostle and Evangelist), Gregory showed himself a tireless apostle and pastor of the Faith, winning converts by both words and the working of miracles. During the Decian persecution (year 250), Bishop Gregory and a large number of the faithful fled to the mountains where they praved for the Martyrs, collecting the relics of the Martyrs following the persecution and instituting solemn feasts in their honor. The whole region became deeply Christian as a result. Saint Gregory reposed in 275.
