Acts 1:1-8 (Epistle)

The former account I made, O Theophilus, of all that Jesus began both to do and teach, until the day in which He was taken up, after He through the Holy Spirit had given commandments to the apostles whom He had chosen, to whom He also presented Himself alive after His suffering by many infallible proofs, being seen by them during forty days and speaking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God. And being assembled together with them, He commanded them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for the Promise of the Father, "which," He said, "you have heard from Me; for John truly baptized with water, but you shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now." Therefore, when they had come together, they asked Him, saying, "Lord, will You at this time restore the kingdom to Israel?" And He said to them, "It is not for you to know times or seasons which the Father has put in His own authority. But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."

John 1:1-17 (Gospel)

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things were made through Him, and without Him nothing was made that was made. In Him was life, and the life was the light of men. And the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not comprehend it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. This man came for a witness, to bear witness of the Light, that all through him might believe. He was not that Light, but was sent to bear witness of that Light. That was the true Light which gives light to every man coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world was made through Him, and the world did not know Him. He came to His own, and His own did not receive Him. But as many as received Him, to them He gave the right to

become children of God, to those who believe in His name: who were born, not of blood, nor of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth. John bore witness of Him and cried out, saying, "This was He of whom I said, 'He who comes after me is preferred before me, for He was before me." And of His fullness we have all received, and grace for grace. For the law was given through Moses, but grace and truth came through Jesus Christ.

PASCHA

The term **Pascha** is the Hebrew word for Passover (*pesach*) rendered in Greek, and then English, letters. Passover was the ancient Jewish feast commemorating the deliverance of the Israelites from bondage in Egypt when the Lord *passed over* each household with lamb's blood on its doorposts thus sparing its firstborn within. Passover (Pascha) refers both to the feast and to the lamb which was sacrificed and eaten in the Israelite households (see Exodus, chapter 12).

Our Lord Jesus Christ was sacrificed on the Cross at the exact time the lambs were being slain in the Jerusalem temple at the feast of Passover (John 19:31-37). The night before Passover, our Lord said to His disciples: "With fervent desire I have desired to eat this Passover

with you before I suffer; for I say to you, I will no longer eat of it until it is fulfilled in the kingdom of God" (Luke 22:15-16).



Christ's Pascha is the fulfillment of Passover, a new and holy Pascha in the Kingdom of God. Therefore the apostle says, "For indeed Christ, our Pascha (Passover), was sacrificed for us. Therefore let us keep the feast..." (1 Cor. 5:7, 8).

The Orthodox have always referred to this Feast of feasts, the death and resurrection of Christ Jesus, with the name **Pascha**. The Divine Liturgy at Pascha defines what the Church is: the baptized faithful gathered to receive the crucified and risen Body and Blood of Christ in Holy Communion. As St. John Chrysostom says: "It is always Pascha," now that we gather for Divine Liturgy in Church, especially on the Day of Resurrection (every Lord's Day, or Sunday).

Paschal Greetings (for 40 days from Pascha to Ascension):

Christ is risen! Indeed He is risen! (English)

Christos anesti! Alithos anesti! (Greek)

Khristos voskrese! Voistinu voskrese! (Slavonic)

Hristo a inviat! Adeverat a inviat! (Romanian)

El Messieh qam! Hakken qam! (Arabic)

Cristo ha ressuscitado! En verdad ha ressuscitado! (Spanish)
